Vaccine a dose of optimism in far north

Moderna greeted with 'a sense of relief' by officials in remote communities

The COVID-19 vaccine has made it to the farthest reaches of Saskatchewan's north, bringing relief to remote communities grappling with continued outbreaks.

The arrival of a two-dose vaccine developed by Moderna, which has less strict storage requirements than another created by Pfizer and BioNTech, means the vaccine can now be transported to the far north, where outbreaks have left communities in extended periods of lockdown or high alert.

"There is certainly a sense of relief. I can see it in my staff," said first allotment."

Derek Keller, the executive director of primary care for the Athabasca Health Authority.

He said the first shots were administered in Stony Rapids on Thursday night; 710 doses have been received and 1,290 more are on the way — enough to vaccinate 1,100 people since the 10-dose vials contain a little bit of extra vaccine.

"We can actually get 11 doses out of there, so we're going to be able to do an extra 100 people in the basin," Keller said.

"We're going to get probably a good third if not 40 per cent of our adult population as a result of this

Fond du Lac Denesuline First Nation had one of the largest outbreaks per capita in Saskatchewan in November.

He said the vaccine is a dose of much-needed optimism.

"We don't know when the end will actually happen, but the end is coming to this pandemic."

Peter Ballantyne Cree Nation (PBCN) Chief Peter Beatty was originally frustrated that vaccines were not immediately slated for delivery to communities in his region, but was relieved when the province announced it would distribute 1,450 doses to the far northeast.

Many of PBCN's communities have been in extended states of lockdown because of outbreaks, but he's thankful that essential workers will soon have some protection, Beatty said on Thursday. "I'm hoping that it will arrive late this evening and we can start vaccinating our front-line workers

early tomorrow." Lac La Ronge Indian Band Chief Tammy Cook-Searson had also written to the Ministry of Health, criticizing what she called a lack of consultation with leaders in the far north east, including herself.

"It feels like it's opened a line of communication (with the province). It's a lot more people involved with the decisions now. So going forward, we hope that things can only get better," Cook-Searson

Adults in remote communities aged 50 and older are one of four priority groups Saskatchewan aims to immunize in the first phase of its vaccine rollout.

The province has formed an advisory committee on immunization in Indigenous communities that includes representation from the Northern Inter-Tribal Health Authority, various provincial bodies and several tribal councils.

In a statement, Métis Nation – Saskatchewan said it was pleased with the status of consultation so

"We are working hard to ensure the unique needs of Métis are a part of an effective and equitable vaccine rollout plan," it said.

Keller said his staff are reaching out to more adults, asking if they would like to be vaccinated.

"We will get through it," he said. "The communities will get through


