To the members of Saskatoon city council,

I read with interest council's plan to discuss the issue of COVID-19 vaccine requirements for city employees and facilities and thank councillor Jeffries for his leadership on this issue. As a physician who has been deeply engaged in healthcare issues during this pandemic, I would like to add my strong support for all efforts that will help to encourage vaccine uptake in our city.

Our healthcare system is on the brink of crisis: this exponential fourth wave of COVID cases are compounding never-before-seen levels of healthcare worker burnout and absenteeism. While I would love to see such measures from higher levels of government, Saskatoon is in a position to move forward with life-saving leadership. Let's focus on areas within our jurisdiction and lead the way.
