I am writing to support the Active Transportation Network Option 1.

• <Context> (as indication of my bike use): I have been an avid bicyclist in Hamburg, Frankfurt (both Germany), and Vancouver (BC). In those places, cycling was my commonly used choice of transport, cycling to work at hospitals (Hamburg, Frankfurt), or to university from the city center (Vancouver).

I recognize that conditions for cycling are more challenging in Saskatoon.

• <Geography> Saskatoon is much easier for cycling (no significant changes in elevation; shorter distances).

• <Climate> Saskatoon is more difficult: length of snow period (I do have a winter bike with screws on tires, and winter gear, but have wiped out in hidden ice ruts and had painful falls). This means that I so far only cycle between mid-April and October (until 1st snow fall).

• <Habits> Saskatchewan drivers are not used to bicyclists. I have learned by default not to cycle on major streets, like 8th St., to avoid being harangued with a well-used four-letter swear-word. This is very upsetting in traffic when I am squeezed between kerb and cars

• <Road conditions> The sides of the roads are often in bad repair with regard to bicycle tires.

• <Perspective> I not only cycle but also walk and drive. I know all three perspectives. When I drive, I too am distracted by bicyclists in traffic, say, when I drive north on Clarence toward the university, where lanes are narrow, trees are close, bumps in the road common, and traffic between 50 and 60 km. I do not meant to denounce drivers in my note here.

• Choices> When I bicycle to the university, I now only use side streets. When I cycle downtown, I am doomed unless I use the bicycle transportation network.

• Greatest Challenge I can handle cycling from Buena Vista through Nutana to the university. The greatest challenge for me is the downtown area. I really appreciate that the 3rd Avenue/Victoria Bridge ("Traffic Bridge") has been re-opened although I wish there was a dedicated bicycle lane). On the roads in downtown, bicyclists and drivers _cannot co-exist_. It is very scary and stressful to always have to be prepared for any parked car's driver door to suddenly open (I was a victim of such an event and hurt myself badly). Car traffic is

more random (cars on the hunt for parking places, maneuvering more erratically). Without a dedicated bicycle lane I will not cycle downtown with my bicycle for fear of my life and injuries.

• <Solutions> If anything, I wish for more cycling options downtown. Given the two options, I would vote for Option 1 (3rd rather than 4th Ave), and noting the existing traffic patterns as they are well described in your discussion.

• **Context** (as indication of my bike use): I have been an avid bicyclist in Hamburg, Frankfurt (both Germany), and Vancouver (BC). In those places, cycling was my commonly used choice of transport, cycling to work at hospitals (Hamburg, Frankfurt), or to university from the city center (Vancouver).

I recognize that conditions for cycling are more challenging in Saskatoon.

- **Geography:** Saskatoon is much easier for cycling (no significant changes in elevation; shorter distances).
- **Climate:** Saskatoon is more difficult: length of snow period (I do have a winter bike with screws on tires, and winter gear, but have wiped out in hidden ice ruts and had painful falls). This means that I so far only cycle between mid-April and October (until 1st snow fall).
- Habits: Saskatchewan drivers are not used to bicyclists. I have learned by default not to cycle on major streets, like 8th St., to avoid being harangued with a well-used four-letter swear-word. This is very upsetting in traffic when I am squeezed between kerb and cars
- Road conditions: The sides of the roads are often in bad repair with regard to bicycle tires.
- **Perspective**: I not only cycle but also walk and drive. I know all three perspectives. When I drive, I too am distracted by bicyclists in traffic, say, when I drive north on Clarence toward the university, where lanes are narrow, trees are close, bumps in the road common, and traffic between 50 and 60 km. I do not meant to denounce drivers in my note here.
- **Choices:** When I bicycle to the university, I now only use side streets. When I cycle downtown, I am **doomed** unless I use the bicycle transportation network.
- Greatest Challenge:
 - I can handle cycling from Buena Vista through Nutana to the university. The greatest challenge for me is the downtown area. I really appreciate that the 3rd Avenue/Victoria Bridge ("Traffic Bridge") has been re-opened although I wish there was a dedicated bicycle lane).
 - On the roads in downtown, bicyclists and drivers cannot co-exist. It is very scary and stressful to always be prepared for any parked car's driver door to suddenly open (I was a victim of such an event and hurt myself badly). Car traffic is more random (cars on the hunt for parking places, maneuvering more erratically). Without a dedicated bicycle lane I will not cycle downtown with my bicycle for fear of my life and injuries.
- **Solutions:** If anything, I wish for more cycling options downtown. Given the two options, I would vote for Option 1 (3rd rather than 4th Ave), and noting the existing traffic patterns as they are well described in your discussion.

Comments: Just yesterday, I cycled down the 4th Avenue bike lane and thought to myself how pleasant and safe it is, compared to cycling in vehicle traffic. I implore City Council to stay the course and retain downtown cycling lanes. If we were to imagine doing away with the existing bike lanes and bowing to the pressure that has been building against them, we would truly keep our city in the dark ages. Major cities around the world have recognized that safe bicycle lanes are critical for encouraging less motor vehicle use and for improving the health of our communities, both through more physical exercise and through reduced air pollution. If I could choose an option, I would choose option 2 (to retain the existing lanes on 4th Avenue) for two reasons: (1) so as not to waste the investment that has already taken place; and (2) because 4th Avenue is much better integrated with the Broadway and University bridges and is closer to the Meewasin Trail (one of our few safe bicycle routes at the moment). I am a Saskatoon resident and am writing briefly to express my hope that you will vote in favour of Option 1 the city administration's recommended plan - for extending the downtown cycling network on Monday, April 29th. As someone who does not own a car and relies on walking, public transportation, and, as much as possible, cycling to get myself around town, I can't overstate the importance of improved cycling infrastructure in this city, and in particular downtown. There is an urgent need to increase safety and accessibility for active transportation, and Option 1 will ensure significant progress in that direction.

There is a lot of research from communities around the globe that show that increasing safety and accessibility through cycling infrastructure and especially protected bike lanes increases active transportation. In short, more people will bike with a comprehensive network of bike lanes. The current lanes downtown have been controversial, but this is undoubtedly in part because they are incomplete. I am positive that with more connections downtown lanes will get more use, which will have benefits for the health and well-being of Saskatoonians, benefits for downtown businesses, and benefits for reducing our emissions.

I urge you to vote for option 1. Saskatoon has the opportunity to make great strides in accessibility and safety for local cycling. Let's not miss it.

Dear Mayor Clark and City Council,

Saskatoon is a great place to live with a high quality of life. It is this quality of life that attracted my family and I to relocate to the city 8 years ago. Over the past decade the city has seen tremendous growth and has developed ambitious plans for the future. The city's Plan for Growth and Active Transportation Plan set a compelling vision for the future that has my family and I excited to continue to grow within the community. I'd like to commend city administration for bringing to the table several excellent mobility choices that contribute to a lively and active city for its citizens. With ambitious plans and excellent mobility options, now we need some political courage. I urge Council to support the recommended downtown protected cycling network as well as the BRT including a route along Broadway Avenue. A commitment to providing real mobility choices is necessary to maintain a high quality of life for citizens as the city grows to a half million residents.

Downtown Protected Cycling Network

- The proposed cycling network along 3rd, 19th and 23rd in combination with Imagine Idylwyld will create a minimum grid to provide the ability for safe commuting by bike for everyone from age 8 to 80. Citizens of our city deserve the right to be able to cycle safely with their family to the downtown library or a restaurant on 3rd avenue.
- The benefits of cycling infrastructure in cities are well documented and have been underscored by the recent successes of minimum grid implementation in Calgary and Edmonton.
- The raised cycle track on Victoria Avenue has shown how successful permanent infrastructure can be in Saskatoon. The downtown cycle network will be no different.
- The network aligns with the city's plan for growth and can be built for less than the cost of 1km of roadway. Vulnerable road users deserve this network.

BRT on Broadway

 Broadway is one of the city's premiere destination districts and BRT needs to be part of it. To be successful the BRT needs to bring people to the places they want to go.
Bypassing Broadway as noted on the Idylwyld option would be a significant error in planning and judgment as it disconnects BRT riders from the heart of the district. BRT will make the district inherently more walkable because it encourages more people to walk the street as they will have convenient reliable access without needing a car.

- Of the remaining options, option 2 is the best match for the current and midterm needs of the district. The option would have minimal construction impacts on the street. It provides BRT stops near the north and south ends of the district providing for convenient access for riders to the majority of Broadway's businesses. It also creates the opportunity for streetscape improvements through new station construction.
- The option recommended by administration does not go far enough in implementing BRT on Broadway. Option 3 will not contribute to changing the perceived culture of riding the bus. And while the option does not result in major construction on Broadway in the short term, it does very little to improve the district besides increased bus frequency. Delaying the decision on a more detailed implementation will do more harm than good. The businesses on Broadway need Council and city administration to commit to a go forward solution so they have some certainty and can plan for the future.

As an employee who works in the Broadway district and community volunteer who moves around with my family by foot, bike and car I am excited by the potential of Saskatoon to continue develop into a world class city with a great quality of life for its citizens. I call on City Council to make BRT and cycling a part of that future by voting for a downtown protected cycling network and BRT route on Broadway. Then please have the political courage to back it up come budget time.

The City of Saskatoon needs a dedicated bicycle path network. Not shared roadways, not shared pathways but a dedicated bicycle path network. Shared roadways are very dangerous for cyclists and shared pathways lead to frequent conflicts with pedestrians (although not life threatening ones). I am nearly 60 years old and healthy due to being able to use my bicycle instead of my car to get to work. By far the most probable potential cause of my death is being hit by a car on Spadina and not from a health cause like a heart attack.

I encourage you to vote in favor of an option that moves the City towards the establishment of a dedicated bicycle path network and to not vote for the option that removes existing efforts to establish bicycle paths downtown.

I would like to register my support for building and expanding bike infrastructure in Saskatoon. I think this is the way of the future and will improve Saskatoon's reputation and quality of life. There are so many benefits that will result from making it easier for more people to use bikes for regular transportation. There will be fewer cars on the road and thus less congestion, lower costs for road maintenance, and less need for on-street parking. By making dedicated bike lanes more convenient and functional there will be less conflict between cars and bikes. When more people ride bikes they are healthier due to activity and all are healthier due to less air pollution. Riding a bike also saves money for the bicycle commuter so they have more to spend on local businesses. Having more people riding bikes for more months of the year due to increased convenience and safety there will be less crime because there are more eyes on the street, more interaction among people as they travel

through the city and more experience of connection among people in different neighbourhoods.

I recently bought an electric bike at a local Saskatoon business in order to commute to work, as I live in Holliston and my workplace is near 51st St. That is a pretty long commute by regular bike, and bus service to my office is not great yet. With the electric bike it is faster and easier than a regular bike and almost as fast as by car. My bike commute is an enjoyable part of my day. I use the bike trails that have been developed along Spadina, 33rd, Victoria, the Traffic Bridge, 23rd St. and 4th Ave. I very much appreciate this infrastructure but I think the downtown portion needs to be upgraded. Lots of people work downtown and by having great bike lanes there it will make it much easier to be a bicycle commuter. I think it would also relieve a lot of downtown parking problems in the evening during summer months because it will be much easier and safer for people to use their bikes when they go out to social events and entertainment.

I think a good bike lane network is a basic requirement for modern progressive cities. I have travelled to places like Denmark, Holland, Spain, Toronto and Vancouver where urban bike transportation is promoted and widely used. These are great cities with vibrant downtown cultures, lots of shops, cafes, restaurants, interesting small businesses and entrepreneurs making life interesting. Saskatoon should strive to be more like these places by investing in bike lanes and other bike infrastructure.

I am looking forward to seeing you vote in favour of "Option 1" at Monday's council meeting.

A lot of people aren't me with my almost superhuman abilities. There are tiny humans, or older humans, or humans who are just trying to improve their cardiovascular situation. There are humans who are actively afraid to compete with traffic, even though they'd love to cruise to downtown shops and malls for a bit of recreation. I'd love to have them be able to join me, safely, for a bike ride in the city.

Motorists, though (many) currently skeptical of the loss of parking spaces, or loss of a passing lane, or whatever, would find that traffic congestion would decrease, and that lanes designed to keep cyclists separate from them, would actually make their driving less fraught with unknowns. When not feeling particularly superhuman, I am a regular user of a car, and I can honestly say that I would EMBRACE having fewer cars taking up the streets, and I would EMBRACE not having to slow down to 5kmh to pass a shaky cyclist who's weaving in and out of parked cars *trying* to stay out of my way.

The planet could use a voice here too (and not just the booming, inarticulate crescendo of a tornado or forest fire or flood or drought). Cycling is THE MOST EFFICIENT form of transportation invented. It beats walking, for crying out loud. We KNOW we have limited time left to avert the most catastrophic consequences of climate change, so why not encourage, with all of our might, one activity that is proven to be "earth friendly" as an alternative to that which is not? We don't have to scrap our cars tomorrow, but why not INCREASE OPTIONS for getting about while we still have an infrastructure to sustain?? Are we honestly suggesting we can spend billions in tax dollars to build massive bridges and overpasses to areas of the city not even inhabited yet, but not a tiny fraction of that to tweak a few existing streets? I strenuously deride (pun 100% intended) such a notion.

To conclude: I don't *need* bikes lanes, but I sure do WANT them. Thank you for your consideration.

City council should be aware of the many benefits of investment in Active Transportation infrastructure. Our neighboring cities Calgary, Edmonton and Winnipeg have recently developed significant networks. AT investments are part of remaining competitive with other Canadian cities, providing excellent quality of lilfe, and amenities that attract and retain our youth, families, and businesses, as well as supporting tourism.

As person with an invisible disability, cycling in this city without an active transportation infrastructure is unsafe and has unfortunately resulted in decreased physical activity and increased automobile use. Unfortunately, part of keeping my disability in check requires that I get more physical activity. I follow the current cycling rules which are actually very difficult, and at times impossible to adhere to with a disability. Despite doing my best I have experienced aggressive behaviour on the part of motorists on numerous occasions. I have even been hit by a motorist! This link shows evidence that motorists often perceive cyclists as less than human: https://usa.streetsblog.org/2019/03/28/study-aggressive-driving-is-linked-to-seeing-cyclists-as-less-thanhuman/. Based on this I believe that Option 3 is an ableist choice.

As a person who works with socially and economically disadvantaged people I see on a daily basis, the impact that lack of access to a personal vehicle can have, within the context of urban life in a city that centers many of it's decisions around motorists.

Lastly, to consult with "business owners" on the proposed cycling paths and to suggest that they have equal say in this matter is also ableist and unjust. To limit active transportation routes, in the interest of business owners and motorists, is to place the importance of business and capitalism over the importance of each community member's attempts at upward mobility, health, and connection to community. The impact of proposed active transportation options on business owners and the impact on community members is not symmetrical and should not be treated as such. Safe mobility is a human right. Owning a business is not.

Not only do I think that city council should oppose Option 3. You should also take an active and progressive approach toward engaging and calling in opponents, de-polarize the issue using whatever access you have to

different media. John Gormley, some time ago, spoke about bike lanes and suggested that they were the reason winter roads were not have snow removed as often as people would like. A family member of mine listens to John Gormley religiously. He doesn't even live in Saskatoon and he was up in arms about bike lanes, meanwhile living in a town of 1200 people, 3.5 hours away. Please find ways to debunk these polarizing claims. Luckily I was able to stop this family member in their tracks by arguing that bike lane snow clearance has nothing to do with street snow clearance, but I have no access to all of Gormley's other listeners. But you do.

I am writing you tonight because the upcoming vote on Monday regarding bike lanes is an important issue to me, and an important issue to every who lives and visits our city.

I am a longtime resident, business owner and father of two whose family is regularly using our current bike system and roadways as a means to commute to school, work and other destinations. My decision to bike regularly is both practical purposes and for the enjoyment of it. I know that I feel better physically and emotionally upon spending time on a bike than I do in a motor vehicle.

I have made the decision to live and work where I do, because it allows me to use bike travel regularly in my life. I have taught my kids how to bike as safely as possible on our existing roadways, but so often we encounter dangerous points where I get quite worried about safety. We wind up having to improvise and tiptoe our way through these dangers, just trying to get around safely.

This upcoming decision which will be made regarding how or if to design bike lanes into our city is very important. It will be a key decision which says that we are either a city which values safe and accessible active transport, or one which has chosen to dedicate the roadways exclusively to cars. And with all of those cars comes the obvious issues of parking, jammed up corridors during busy hours, noise, and a sense of entitlement that cars will have over people on our streets.

If the decision to not include bike lanes is made, bicycles and other modes of active transport will be lost between choosing to either ride on the street which so many residents will not be comfortable doing (and face the dangers of aggressive drivers) or riding on the sidewalks (which we all know to be a ticketable offence, and make for angry pedestrians).

I would be very disappointed if this council decided not to include bike lanes in the upcoming plans for the city. Please do not choose cars over people.

SUMMARY REPORT: DOWNTOWN ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION NETWORK

Options for Consideration

This section provides three potential network options for active transportation corridors in the Downtown. Two of the three network options are very similar in that they propose a formal Downtown network, while the third option proposes no dedicated network. Prior to analyzing the options, some context is required to provide additional perspective.

In developing potential network options, Downtown streets were assessed using several factors:

- Connectivity;
- Safety of the active transportation facilities;
- Potential conflicts between all street users including pedestrians, cyclists and motor vehicles;
- Potential impacts to motor vehicle level of service and travel time; and
- Potential impacts to other street uses such as transit stops and parking spaces.

Given that context, each of the subsequent options have been evaluated primarily by using the technical criteria outlined above. In addition to technical criteria, stakeholder and community input was used to inform the process. Where possible, each option is also evaluated on how well it supports the City's strategic objectives, Growth Plan principles, and sustainability principles.

Option 1: Establish Network on 3rd Avenue, 19th Street, and 23rd Street

This option proposes that City Council endorse the Downtown Active Transportation Network of 3rd Avenue, 19th Street, and 23rd Street. According to pubic engagement results, this network configuration was preferred by 78 of the 100 people who chose to indicate a preference for a northsouth Downtown active transportation corridor.



The estimated cost to proceed with detailed design work of the Downtown network is \$400,000. The capital investment for construction of the Downtown Active Transportation Network is estimated at \$3.7 million, which includes enhanced pedestrian facilities, improvements to the public realm and dedicated cycling facilities.

Advantages:

Supports the recommendations in the Growth Plan, the Active Transportation Plan and the Street Design Policy.

Builds upon previous streetscaping investments to improve pedestrian infrastructure along 3rd Avenue.

Potential to maximize investments in existing cycling infrastructure.

Addresses connections for the active transportation network beyond Downtown with excellent connectivity and smooth transitions north and south of the study area.

Provides cyclists with a continuous network of dedicated cycling facilities on busy, high-traffic Downtown streets.

Improves the level of safety for vulnerable road users.

Cyclists, pedestrians and drivers are familiar with the cycling facility on 23rd Street.

3rd Avenue has a consistent right-of-way width, allowing for a single configuration, design and operation through the length of the facility.

The presence of a centre median on 3rd Avenue between 20th Street and 22nd Street reduces the number of conflict points improving the safety of the street.

Existing land use and built form along 3rd Avenue produces a pedestrian-oriented development pattern that supports all modes of transportation.

3rd Avenue has a significant amount of street-level activity due to more storefronts, which can be more attractive for pedestrians and cyclists.

3rd Avenue has lower Annual Average Daily Traffic than 4th Avenue.

Parking is not impacted on 19th Street.

Vehicle Level of Service (LOS) is not impacted on 19th Street or 23rd Street.

Disadvantages:

Cyclists, pedestrians and drivers are not familiar with a cycling facility on 3rd Avenue or 19th Street.

Parking is impacted on 23rd Street and 3rd Avenue (approximately 13 spaces and 54 spaces respectively).

At peak hour, vehicle level of service at 3rd Avenue and 20th Street is reduced from LOS B to LOS C.

Prior investment in cycling facilities on 4th Avenue is lost due to relocation to 3rd Avenue.



Option 2: Establish 4th Avenue, 19th Street, and 23rd Street

This option is very similar to Option 1, but with one important difference. It uses 4th Avenue as the north-south corridor of the network but keeps 23rd Street and 19th Street as the east-west corridors. According to public engagement results, 4th Avenue was preferred by 22 of the 100 people who chose to indicate a preference for a north-south Downtown active transportation corridor.

Like Option 1, the estimated cost to proceed with detailed design work of the Downtown network is \$400,000. The capital investment for construction of the Downtown Active Transportation Network is estimated at \$3.7 million which includes enhanced pedestrian facilities, improvements to the public realm and dedicated cycling facilities.

Advantages:

Supports the recommendations in the Growth Plan, the Active Transportation Plan and the Street Design Policy.

Improves the level of safety for vulnerable road users.

Provides cyclists with a network of dedicated cycling facilities on busy, high-traffic Downtown streets.

Cyclists, pedestrians and drivers are familiar with the cycling facilities on 4th Avenue and 23rd Street.

4th Avenue is fairly central to Downtown providing decent network coverage.

Parking is not impacted on 19th Street.

Vehicle level of service is not impacted on 19th Street or 23rd Street.

Disadvantages:

Cyclists, pedestrians and drivers are not familiar with a cycling facility on 19th Street.

4th Avenue has an inconsistent right-of-way width, requiring the design and operation of the street to change through the length of the corridor.

On 4th Avenue, there are challenges connecting beyond Downtown at key intersections such as at 25th Street and at the Broadway Bridge.

4th Avenue does not have a centre median to restrict turning movements from driveways increasing the opportunity for conflicts.

Parking is impacted on 23rd Street and 4th Avenue (approximately 13 spaces and 58 spaces respectively).

4th Avenue has a higher Annual Average Daily Traffic than 3rd Avenue.

At peak hour, vehicle level of service along 4th Avenue at 20th Street, 21st Street, and 22nd Street is reduced from LOS B to LOS C.



Option 3: No Formal Downtown Network

This option proposes no formal Downtown Active Transportation Network and thus, the removal of the existing protected bike lanes on 23rd Street and 4th Avenue. Specifically, this option eliminates dedicated facilities for cyclists through Downtown and would require cyclists to share the travel lane with vehicles.

Advantages:

Restores previous parking volumes along 4th Avenue and 23rd Street (increase of approximately 42 spaces). Facilitates slight improvements to vehicle level of service. Lowers demand on driver attention at conflict points.

Disadvantages:

Does not support the recommendations in the Growth Plan, the Active Transportation Plan or the Street Design Policy.

Does not provide cyclists with a network of dedicated cycling facilities on busy, high-traffic Downtown streets.

Does not provide enhanced facilities for active transportation users through the Downtown.

Lowers the level of safety for vulnerable road users.

Loss of prior investments made in 23rd Street and 4th Avenue.

RECOMMENDATION

The Administration recommends that City Council adopt Option 1, and establish the Downtown Active Transportation Network along 3rd Avenue, 19th Street, and 23rd Street.

RATIONALE

Option 1 tends to generate the most advantages for a Downtown Active Transportation Network. More specifically, and considering the technical network analysis that was conducted, a Downtown Active Transportation Network of 3rd Avenue, 23rd Street, and 19th Street is intended to maximize investments in existing active transportation infrastructure, and provide a continuous network of facilities on busy, high-traffic Downtown streets.

Moreover, the proposed recommendation minimizes the various trade-offs that emerge between the variety of users and functions that these Downtown streets serve. For example, the recommended network integrates the active transportation plan into other Downtown initiatives including Bus Rapid Transit. As a result, its design provides the most optimal approach in achieving a balance for all users (motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians) in the Downtown.

I understood that council desires to attract business to the downtown core but if parking is a concern, consumers will merely gravitate to malls. A case in point, although not quite downtown but a good example, City Center Physicians moved their practice along with support services to Stonebridge because parking around the City Hospital area was a nightmare.

Parking in the downtown has been an issue for a long time. It appears that the idea of a multi-level parkade on a small land footprint seems like a foreign idea to city planners and council. The current scattering of single level lots accommodating a handful of vehicles is inadequate so it doesn't make sense to reduce the spaces even further. With the talk of a downtown civic center, possibly encroaching on Mid-Town plaza parking, makes a recipe for killing the downtown business district. The Bay Parkade, in its day, housed large numbers of cars but someone decided it was structurally unsafe. Funny that it took all summer, with heavy equipment, to finally beat it down. Shame!

Having originated from Edmonton (4 times plus the size of Saskatoon), I note that their bike lanes are in the periphery of the downtown core and definitely not on main thoroughfares. If I didn't know better, I would even suspect that the current proposal before council, to expand bike lane dedication, is part of a bigger plan - to pressure the public to accept the rapid transit concept. For this town to grow to a 0.5 million progressive city and actually need rapid transit - is a pipe dream. Attachments:

The Downtown Active Transportation Network

This is submitted on behalf of Bus Riders of Saskatoon. We are a Facebook based group of over 900 members, guided by a Steering Committee. Along with our regular meetings, we meet monthly with Saskatoon Transit management on issues of concern to transit users. We have a representative on the Active Transportation Advisory Group.

There has been much discussion of the components of the active transportation network and enhancements to the transit system. What sometimes gets lost in this forest of details is consideration of the needs of the City as a whole. While each component is important, we need to look at the broader context. To that end I think it is important that we consider some general principles as follows with a focus on Bus Rapid Transit.

General Principles

1. BRT is just one aspect of "Getting Around" and needs to be designed within the context of our other transportation options. These include commercial vehicles, private passenger vehicles, emergency vehicles, pedestrian infrastructure and the cycling network.

2. BRT needs to take people from where they are to where they want to go.

3. The transit system always needs to address the needs of captive users - the large number of people for whom the bus is the only way to move around the City. These people can't afford to own a vehicle, are unable to drive due to their age or a disability or a medical issue or some other personal reason.

4. Although our transit system needs to be built to serve Saskatoon in the future, it is imperative that it serves today's riders. The hypothetical riders of tomorrow don't ride transit today, don't pay fares and don't boost ridership numbers.

5. The transit service needs to be frequent, and the transit system needs to be reliable. BRT meets these needs. It will provide frequent service that takes the guess work out of travelling by bus and minimizes the potential for missed transfers. This is the most frequent complaint of our members. "Will I reach my

school, my workplace, my medical appointment or my romantic assignation on time?" is a question that bus riders using BRT will no longer need to ask themselves. As has been proven with the frequent service pilot routes, increased frequency takes away a stress factor for many transit users and this alone, will boost ridership.

As for BRT and the Active Transportation Network, Bus Riders of Saskatoon fully supports extending this network in the downtown area. All transit users have to walk to reach the point where they board transit and again to reach their final destination after getting off the bus. All bus riders therefore are pedestrians and so pedestrian infrastructure is important to us. Some transit users are summer, seasonal or fair weather cyclists who use transit regularly only in winter or during inclement weather. Our goals – ease of getting around safely – complement those of cyclists. We believe the best return on investment is for the City is to run BRT down 3rd Avenue and would propose Council choose Option Two, Fourth Avenue for protected bike lanes that assure safety and connectivity for cyclists.

First and foremost, I want to acknowledge that the decisions before you are not inconsequential and appreciate that their weight must be a heavy burden to bear.

I wish to express my support for the implementation of the BRT and strongly support the 1st Ave and Broadway routing. Beyond the lack of consensus regarding the final routing, the merits of the BRT are muted in comparison to the separated downtown bike lanes. Should the dedicated bike lanes go forward, my preferred option of the N-S spine of the bike network would be 3rd Ave for reasons of best connectivity and options for expansion at either end. The rest of this letter addresses the bike lanes.

Much of the discussion around the downtown bike lanes that I have personally engaged in, and have witnessed in the news and social media has revolved around the merits, pros and cons, of the options before you. Surprisingly though, what hasn't really seemed to be discussed is that these decisions have broader long-term implications and will dictate how we collectively decide to develop and move around our city going forward. This is indeed a watershed moment and I don't think that most seem to get beyond taking a self-interested perspective and get lost in the details of lost parking spaces, congestion, personal convenience, potential effects on business, name your talking point, etc. If we filter out all the noise, what is really being debated here is whether we are going to continue to let auto-orientated development continue to dictate just about every aspect of our civic daily lives (at the cost of everything else)? I encourage you as Council to look beyond the dissenting

voices (though very numerous), and consider what is the most efficient, resilient, and cost-effective way to move forward. Research, history, common sense, and logic will confirm that it isn't single-occupant automobiles (including autonomous).

It should be apparent, but the pendulum has swung so far to one side on this matter that going back the other direction is sure to cause disruption in the businesses and lives of many; I'm sure many people have tried to make you aware of this in the last few years. I don't argue this, some concerns are likely valid, but most are blown out of proportion in a distorted market that rewards personal over-consumption of public goods, and are rooted primarily in the promotion of self-interest. But I have to ask based on this continued approach: Are

municipal finances improving? Infrastructure commitments and liabilities going down? Are municipal taxes going down and levels of service going up? Is there a perceived safe environment provided for all people who choose to cycle downtown? Is it current mode share environmentally efficient? Does it promote social equity? I could go on, but the answer to all is a resounding NO. Should we not then be taking a more aggressive and unconventional approach to try to improve these things?

I hesitate at even drawing attention to the immense importance of these decisions as there still seems to be a few of you who seem bent on maintaining the status quo to maintain favour amongst the majority of your ward residents (people talk and share your responses to their letters) and repeating the mistakes of the last 100 years when it comes to land use and transportation planning. I just don't get it and I fear bringing attention to what is truly at stake here because it sounds like some of you are going to choose wrong because the fear of change and backlash is too great. I don't build a case not to make a necessary change. Delaying or putting it off for a couple years until other aspects of the ATP are implemented, or when the "timing is better", is not good either. This is a flaming emergency that requires course correction now.

I implore Council, please LEAD on this matter. Many, if not all of you, have said at various times in the lead up to this decision, something along the lines of "this is what I am hearing from my residents"; or something similar. We did not elect you to simply execute the will of the majority of ward residents. Leading is different, and often the opposite of representing the majority public opinion. Very few will ask or support something that will change an aspect of their daily life, nevermind if they further perceive it to affect them for the worse - this is human nature. But that gets us nowhere and we will continue to amplify the same problems. We need Council to consider these decisions rationally and take a stand for what might not be popular and what might be challenging, and in all of our long-term best interest.

Relevant personal background:

-I have cycled year-round as a form or commuting starting in grade 6 (early 90s). I have yet to encounter conditions that were unmanageable in Saskatoon. Even though we can get deep cold, cold and dry makes for completely manageable conditions and is far better than wet or melt.

-Until recently worked downtown and commuted year-round by bicycle as it was the most efficient option with respect to time and costs.

-Used the 4th Ave bike lanes daily

-Comfortable riding in auto traffic; preferred them to the poorly implemented trial lanes.

-We manage with 1 household auto. Consciously choose to minimize use where possible, but do still drive.

Issues of added pollution have been expressed and there is a simple technological fix, and that is electric or hydrogen buses. The city can work towards that, but this is still the best route. Not everything in life revolves around driving and parking cars. One can hope that a positive outcome from the BRT on Broadway would be that the consistent bus service would make it more convenient to bus to Broadway than to drive, which would ease the congestion that already exists.

In regards to the bike lines, I fully agree with Administration, and highly encourage Council to adopt Option 1, and establish the Downtown Active Transportation Network along 3rd Avenue, 19th Street, and 23rd Street. As a pedestrian and a biker, I know there is value in moving forward with the protected cycling network downtown.
