The Friends of the Saskatoon Afforestation Areas Inc. (FSAAI) is very pleased to see the recommendation by Administration with regard to proceeding with the development of pilot management plans for the Small Swale and Richard St Barbe Baker Afforestation Area (RSBBAA).

We very much encourage City Council to approve this recommendation moving forward.

As pointed out in the reference reports these two areas combined provide over \$1,000,000 per year in ecosystem services. Using the figure of up to \$16,000 as the value of a large, healthy tree, as referenced in a 2017 City of Saskatoon report, the value of the RSBBAA would be much higher.

In addition:

- In RSBBAA over 17 species at risk have been identified on either e-Bird or through iNaturalist photos
- The areas are prime places to study regeneration, ecological succession, geology, First Nations history and ethnobotany
- The West Swale is a remnant of the Yorath Island Glacial Spillway. The spillway and its
 connection to the river valley influenced paleo-Indian activity in the area. The potential is
 there to study spiritual, medicinal, and nutritional uses of the area from a First Nations
 historical perspective. The post-contact historic Old Bone Trail is another heritage
 element
- Honouring the legacy of Richard St. Barbe Baker, a pioneering Global Conservationist, who had many ties to Saskatoon
- The role of these areas as carbon sinks
- Protecting these areas matches many of the goals identified by the UN for both Sustainable Development and Ecological Restoration
