Property Maintenance Backlog resulting from two Fire Bylaw Inspectors addressing inadequate housing is: 1,212, Priority 3 concerns. Priority 3 concerns are junk and garbage, junked vehicles, overgrown grass and weeds, and other conditions that are nuisances that affect the amenity of neighborhoods or unsightly. It is anticipated that this backlog will continue to increase.

Encampment Fires are documented with the creation of a benchmark called "encampment" in SFD Computer Aided Dispatch allowing Operations to report fires involving encampments.

Seven neighborhoods are impacted the most by inadequate housing, structure fires, graffiti, needle retrievals, overdoses, vacant/boarded buildings, and property maintenance concerns. This data criteria were used, outlining areas of concern within these neighborhoods that are similar to the Saskatoon Police Service's data and areas of concern. These neighborhoods are currently hot spots for SFD having the highest number of incidents and concerns looking at a 4 ½ year trend (2023 is until August 1).
