Comments:

To the Standing Policy Committee on Transportation:

I am writing in support of the proposed 30km/h speed limit for the neighbourhood bikeways. I live in Haultain and work at USask and cycling, taking the bus, and walking are the main ways my family gets around.

I've written to the city before about the need for improvements to cycling safety after Natasha Fox's death, and was told that there would be an audit to ensure they are accounting for the safety of "all road users" before any changes would be considered. But all road users are not equally at risk of harm! Cyclists and pedestrians are more vulnerable, and if a car does hit us, their speed can truly be a matter of life or death. Just telling drivers to be more careful in lieu of changes to infrastructure is a good way to make careless drivers resentful (because "cyclists break the rules too!") and cautious drivers paranoid, as it is genuinely difficult to share the roads safely here. Drivers need to be supported with safer infrastructure too, and lower speed limits is a clear way to make to roads safer for everyone.

Changing the speed limit also makes things less intimidating for new cyclists. The only reason I feel like I can cycle here is because I moved here from Montreal where I had several years to learn to cycle with much more robust infrastructure. Here, sharing the road involves a lot of cars driving very close and passing very quickly, and I have been told by drivers more than once to "go use the bike lane" in a part of town where there isn't one available. The deaths of Natasha Fox and Darin Kinniewess have also been devastating, and if I wasn't already dedicated to cycling, I would probably have given up already! Despite all this, Saskatoon has a lot of potential as a cycling town. The fact that anyone here still cycles should be considered evidence that there is a HUGE desire to cycle here, because it's not easy!

Concrete infrastructure changes, like lower speed limits, make things safer for everyone. This change would also make Saskatoon neighbourhoods more pleasant to be in for everyone, rather than sacrificing the safety of the local community for the sake of shaving a few minutes off the commute time for people who live further out. Saskatoon is not a huge place; 30km/h is plenty fast to get across town. Changes like this can mean that even when accidents occur, the worst-case scenario is a lot less harmful for everyone involved.

Please implement 30km/h speed limits, thank you!
