We are very, very pleased to see this policy proposal come before City Council for decision. We trust that Council will pass this Bylaw unanimously as a signal to all of society that it is absolutely crucial to lower motor vehicle speeds on those streets specifically dedicated to the desirable goals of improving and supporting Active Transportation.
