Joyfully advocating for nature. That's what we do. So, here we go!





The Northeast Swale and Small Swale are treasures, places of abundant life and beauty. With less than 5% of the original prairie remaining in the Saskatoon region, they are unique and precious.

Marvelous in all seasons.





That's not all. They are home to a myriad of species: birds, insects, amphibians, mammals, plants.

















More species or habitats are discovered each time people do assessments, such as a second sharp-tailed grouse lek and a rare marl bog. If this proposed highway goes through, we may be destroying species and places we don't even know are there.





Many of the species we know live there are Species of Conservation Concern, which means they are rare, threatened species at risk of extirpation or extinction:

- American Badger
- Northern Leopard Frog
- Baird's Sparrow
- Bobolink
- Short-eared Owl
- Crowfoot Violet

The Swales are a refuge for plants and animals who are fast losing places to live let alone thrive.







A multilane high-speed highway through the Swales would further damage and fragment an already fragmented ecosystem bringing with it further harms including highway and construction deaths, vehicle pollution, exposure to noise and light pollution, and incursion of invasive introduced species.





It has also been documented that there are health risks for people living within 500 meters of a highway such as this, thus bringing harm to people who will live in neighbourhoods planned for the future.

- Providing public spaces to relax, connect with nature, gather together, and be inspired.

Why oh why, would we want to put a high-speed highway through all this, a highway that would do damage beyond measure that could not be repaired or compensated for elsewhere?

To shift the highway (if it must be built) further north out of the Swales would leave these spaces able to function, give us the room to further protect and restore them, and let the species inhabiting the Swales continue their lives.

The Swales could become the centre of the proposed Meewasin National Urban Park. What a benefit that would be for the Swales and for the people of Saskatoon and beyond. By refusing to endorse Phase 2, you will align your actions with the City's environmental programs and policies supporting nature, biodiversity, and climate action:

Pathways for an Integrated Green Network
Natural Areas Policy Framework
Wetlands Policy
Low Emissions Community Plan
Water Conservation Strategy

In addition, this decision would honour the City's commitment to optimize the economic, social and environmental aspects of its Triple Bottom Line.
