

# Community Changes and Response to Emergency Shelters



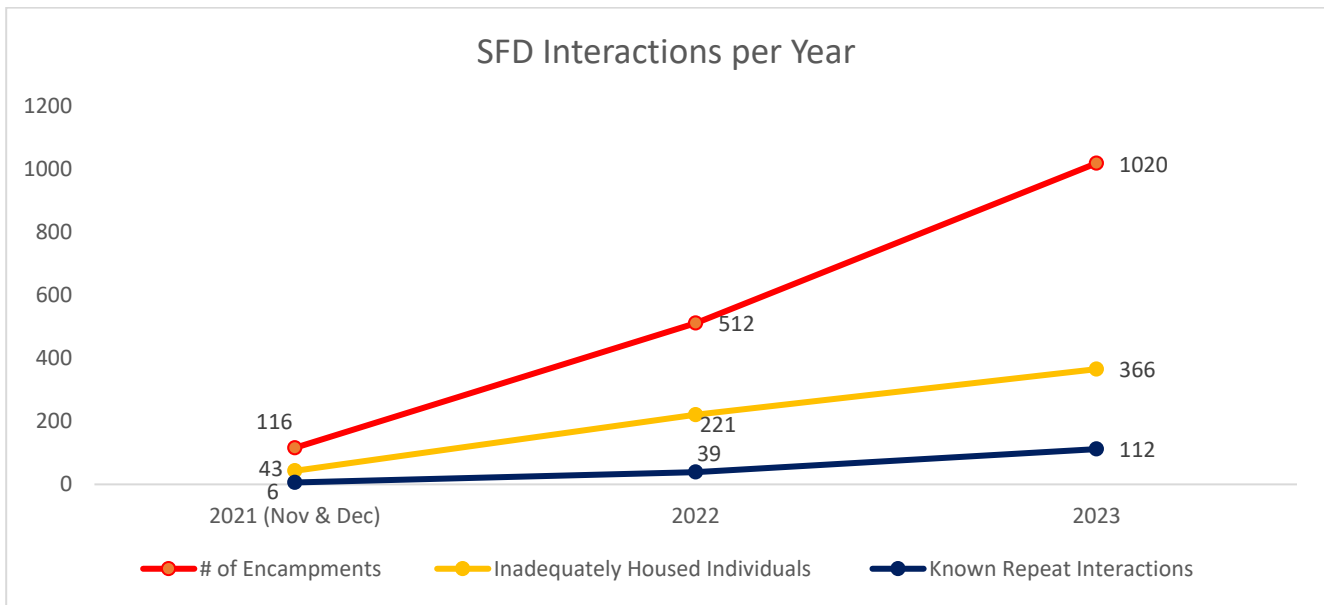
The following report is a compilation of statistics and analysis from the Saskatoon Police Service (SPS) and the Saskatoon Fire Department (SFD).

This report is a response to a request from City Council found in Appendix A.

## Saskatoon Fire Department

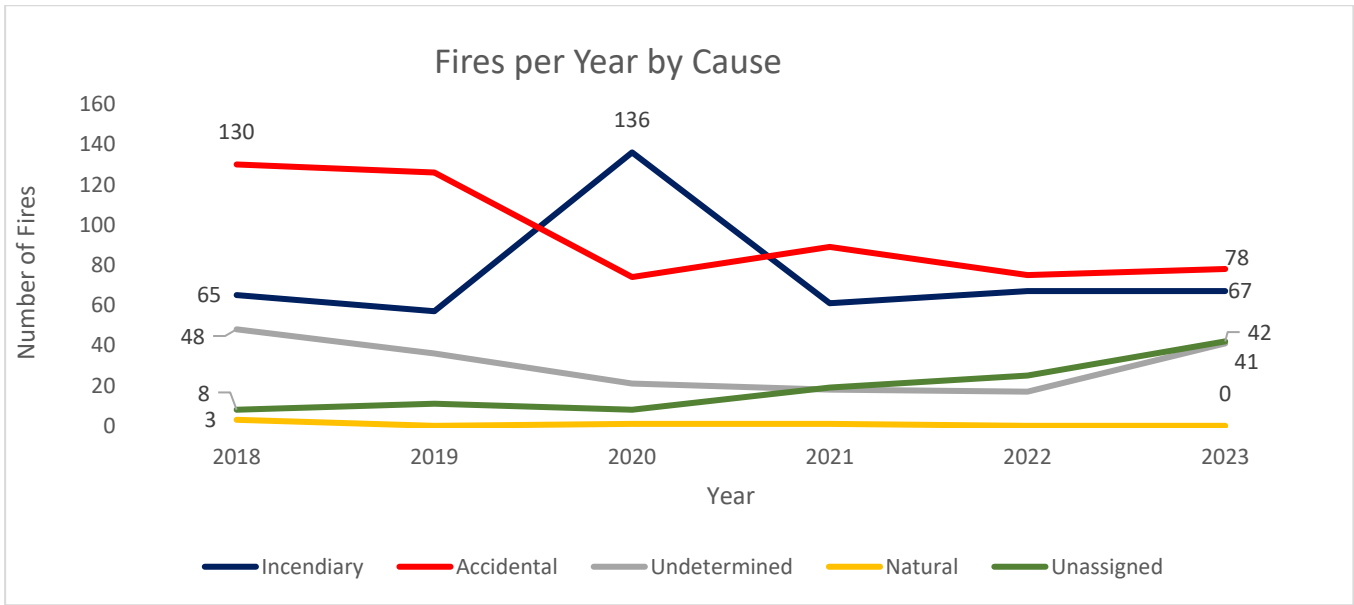
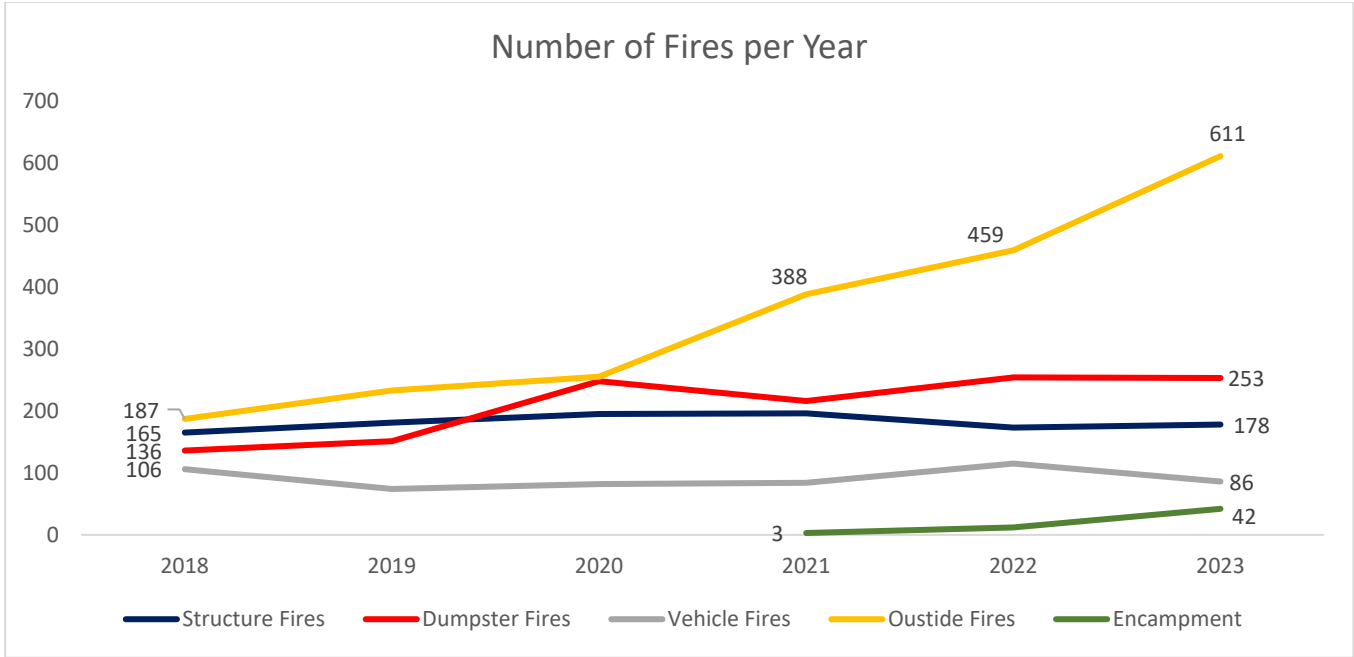
### Inadequate Housing and Encampments

2023 saw the number of SFD interactions with encampments almost double from the amount in 2022. Interactions with inadequately housed individuals increased 65.6%. These statistics show the increased need for adequate and supportive housing in Saskatoon.

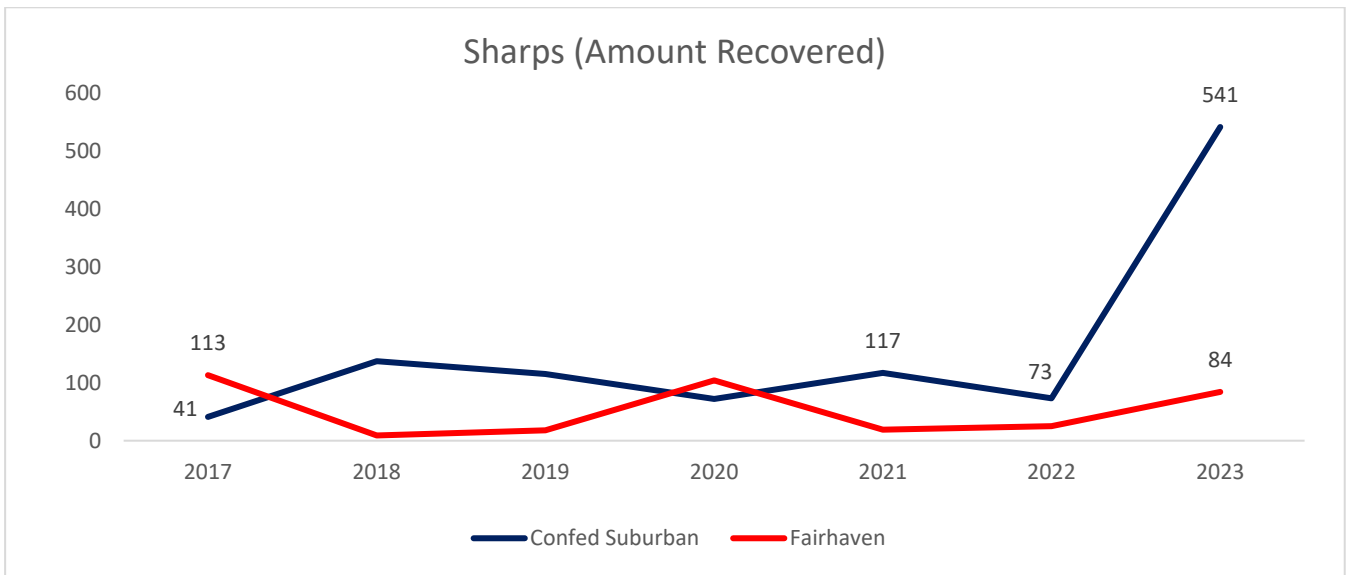
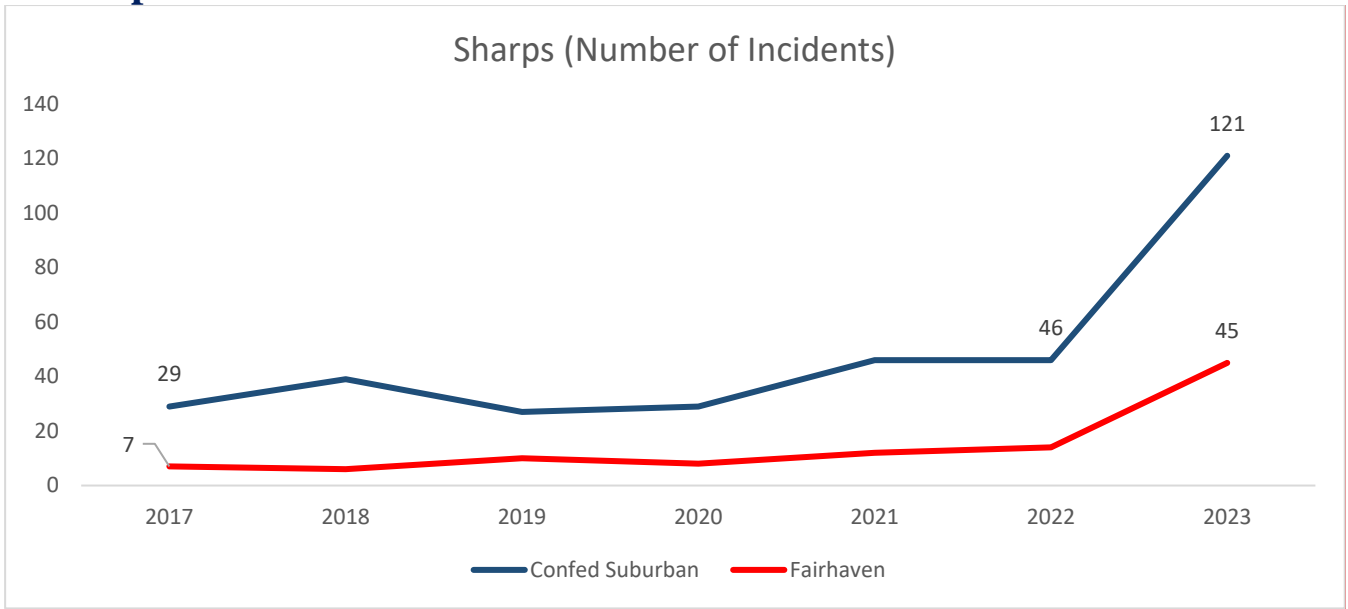


Along with encampments, come increased fire risk. Structure fires have remained relatively steady while outside fires have notably increased each year since 2018. In 2021, SFD began to track encampment fires which are also on the rise. In 2023, there were 42 Encampment fires.

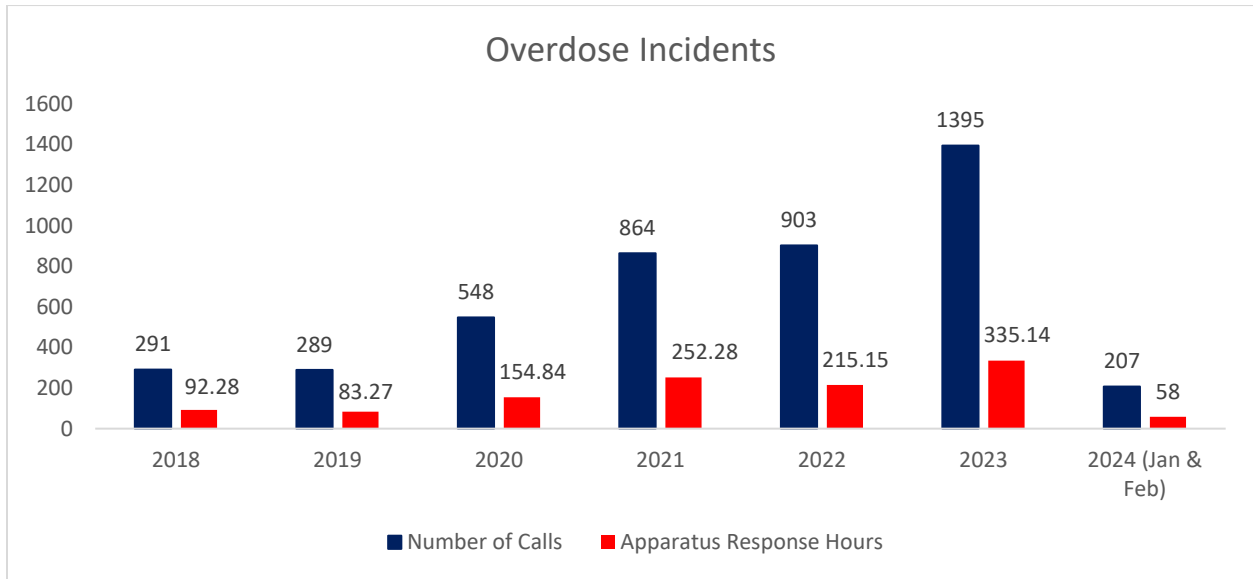
The risk of outside fires spreading beyond its origin and area is actual. Many outside fires that do not meet the outdoor burning bylaw, are required to be extinguished and the source of the material and ignition device need to be removed. In some instances, the area needs to be wet down to reduce the risk of embers or re-ignition. Grass and structure fires put the community at risk of safety to life and property loss. The largest loss thus far in our community occurred from an encampment fire that spread to a double detached garage which resulted in a total loss of the structure.

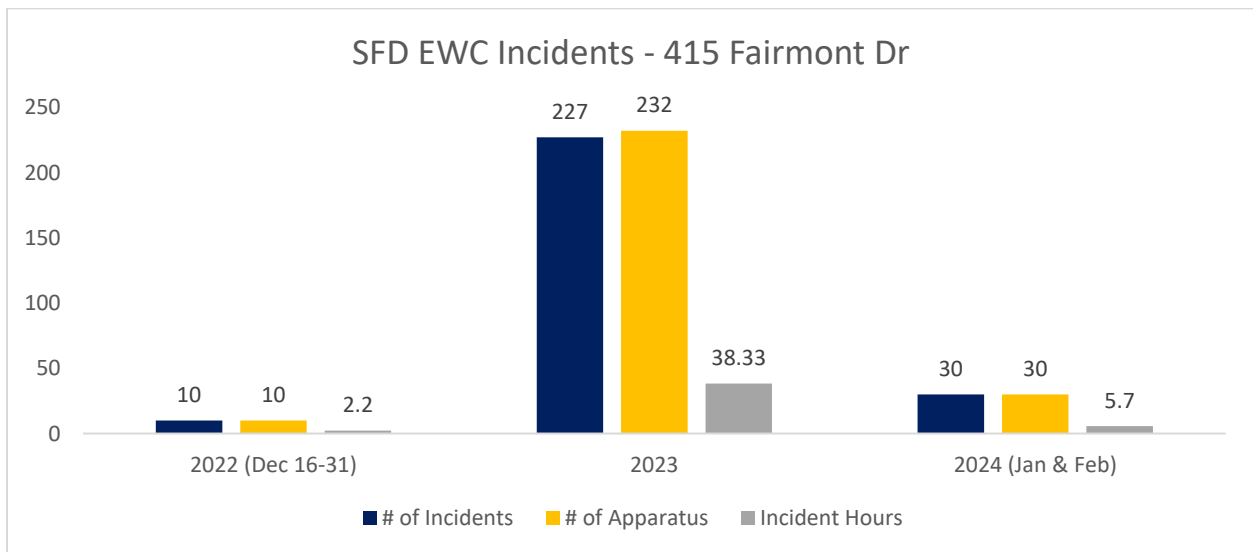


## Overdoses



## EWC Incidents

Incidents are reactive responses where an emergency or near to an emergency has occurred and front-line fire engines or Inspectors are dispatched to attend and mitigate the incident such as medical calls, public assistance and fire alarm/protection signals as examples. Some responses require more than one fire engine/apparatus to respond depending on the nature of the incident.



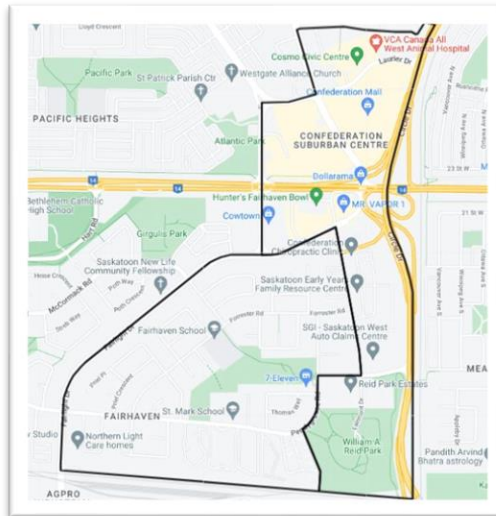
# Saskatoon Police Service

## Intro: Crime in Saskatoon

The SPS is proud to serve the City of Saskatoon, working towards a safer and healthier city. As with any dynamic, vibrant city like Saskatoon, the public safety environment evolves with its size, culture and trends. To understand how individual neighbourhoods are changing with comparison to the city as a whole, a few city-wide statistics should be understood.

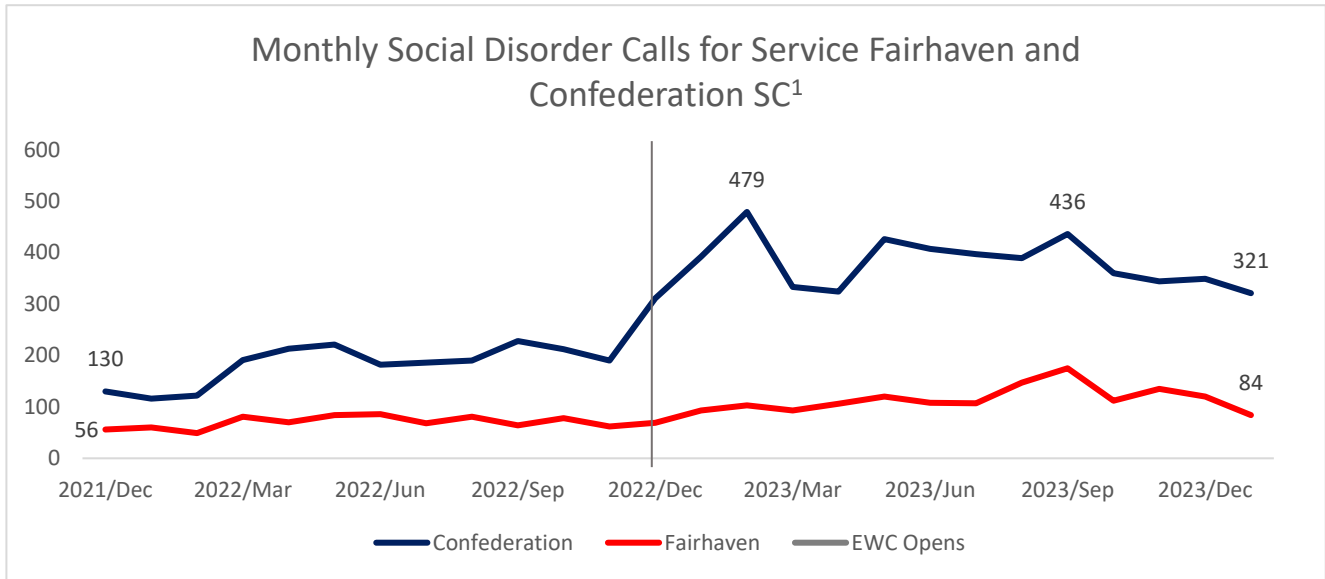
For the first time in SPS history, 2023 saw over 150,000 calls for service being made to the Saskatoon Police. Calls for service received increased 12% from 2022 to 2023. Property Crime increased to 17976 from 16820, showing an increase of 6.87%. Violent crime also increased city wide by 7.33%, from 4131 to 4434.

## Calls for Service in Fairhaven and Confederation Suburban Centre (SC)



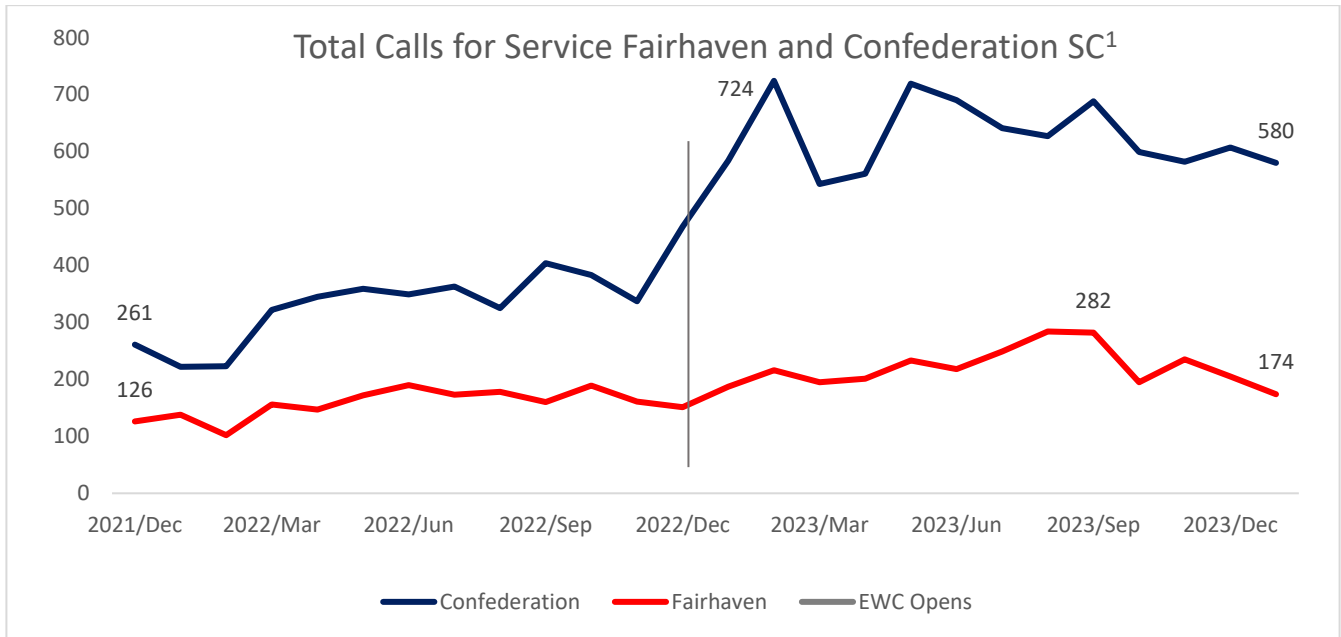
Calls for service reflect community concerns and residents' perception of safety. When the SPS receives a call for service, it is categorized into a call type, which reflects the kind of situation the caller is referring to. Increasingly, the SPS has seen calls for service reflecting social disorder, which can turn into criminal activity but, reflect addictions, homelessness, mental health or other non-criminal matters. These calls for service often affect citizen perception of safety and police do respond to them, however they often do not result in occurrences or arrests due to the nature of the situation. Police aim to find the balance between responding to citizen concerns, and encouraging vulnerable populations to access community supports available to them to ensure appropriate response to difficult situations. As shown in the graph below, the social disorder call types make up just over half of the calls for service received in Confederation SC and just under half of the calls for service received in Fairhaven. Social disorder calls have regularly represented

over 50% of all calls for service received. Data regarding calls for service and social disorder in addition to the below graphs can be found in Appendix B.

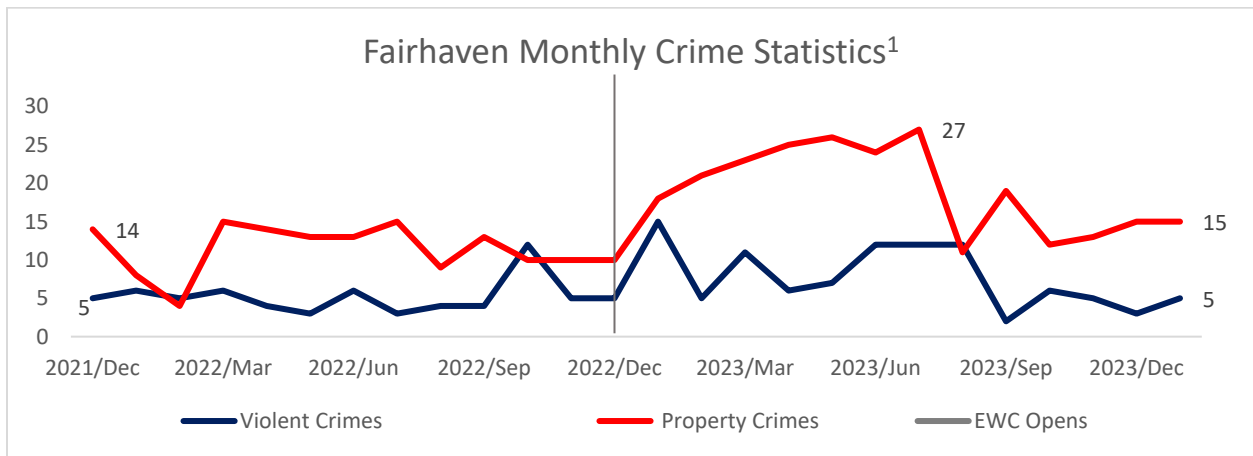


*Social Disorder Calls for Service are defined as: Suspicious Persons, Intoxication, Indecent Exposure, Disturbance, Need Ambulance, Drug Offences, Mental Health, Panhandling.*

Total calls for service in Fairhaven and Confederation SC have increased 38% and 122% respectively.



## Fairhaven Crime Statistics



Violent crime in Fairhaven has fluctuated before and after the EWC opened. During the time period analyzed, there was one month of increased violent crime before the EWC opened, and a few months afterwards, however December 2021 and Jan 2024 show the same number of monthly incidents.

Property Crime had increased since the EWC opened, almost doubling before it began to decrease in late summer 2022. The current timeline shows that it is decreasing back towards levels seen in 2021. It should be noted that property crime does tend to increase during the summer, once data is available for summer of 2024, it will be easier to say with confidence if property crime has returned to levels similar to 2021.

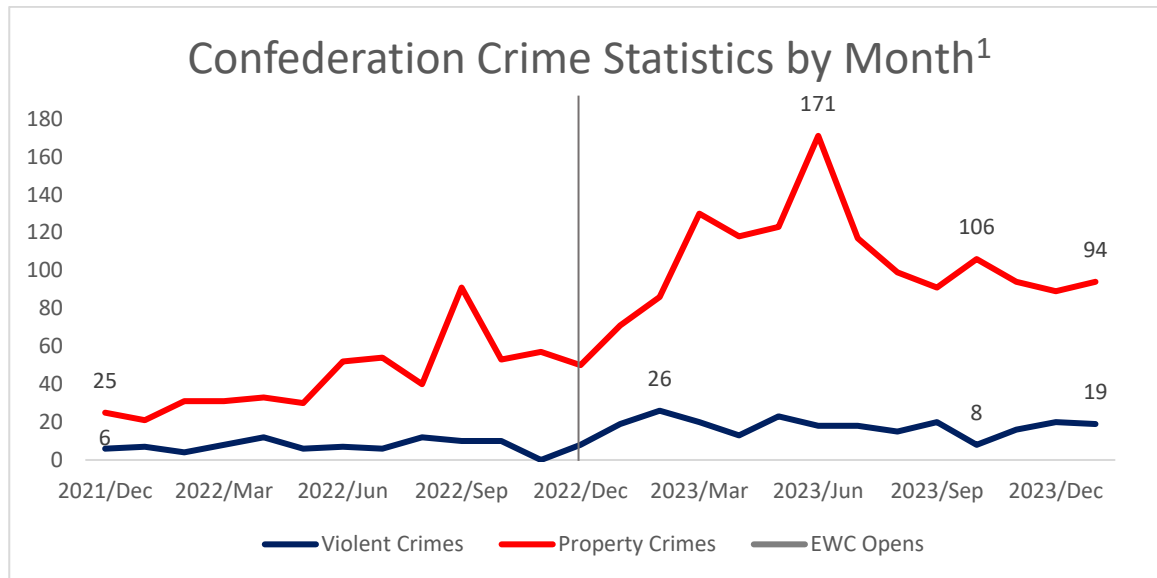
Top 5 Types of Calls for Service Received in 2023 (Final call types) <sup>1</sup>

Initial call types describe what a caller is expressing concerns about. Suspicious persons can reflect a number of different situations but include people who are exhibiting suspicious or concerning behaviour such as being in an unexpected place, or appearing vulnerable. In Fairhaven, three of the top five call types are related to social disorder and reflect concern for vulnerable populations.

## Confederation SC Crime Statistics



Violent crime has increased, particularly with respect to common assaults and robberies. Approximately 1/3 of these crime types happen at commercial businesses in Confederation SC and have specifically included assaults against loss prevention officers or employees.

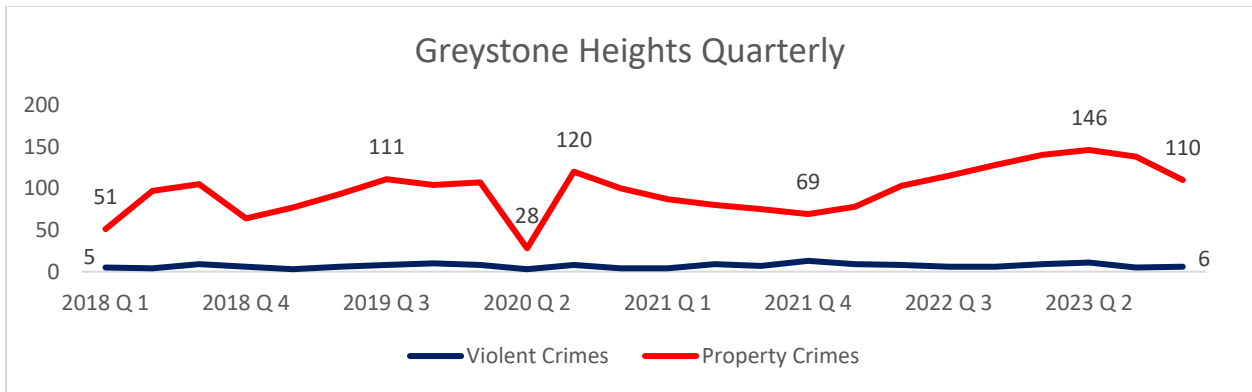
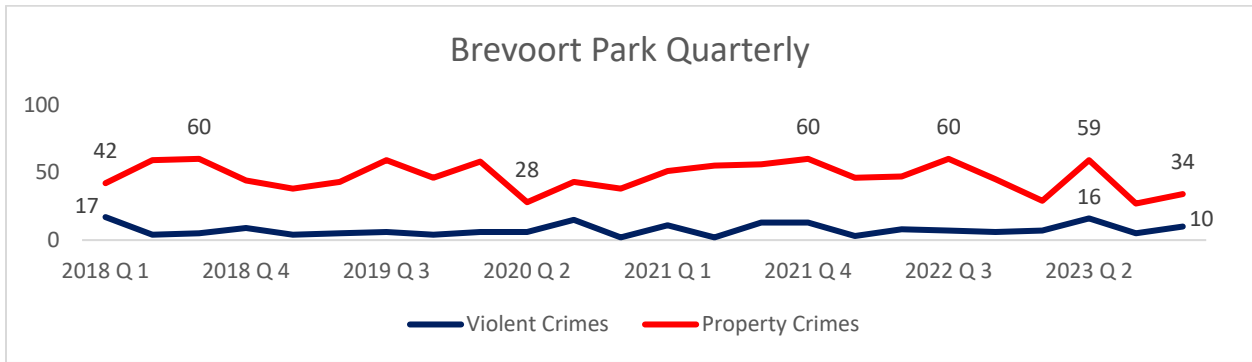
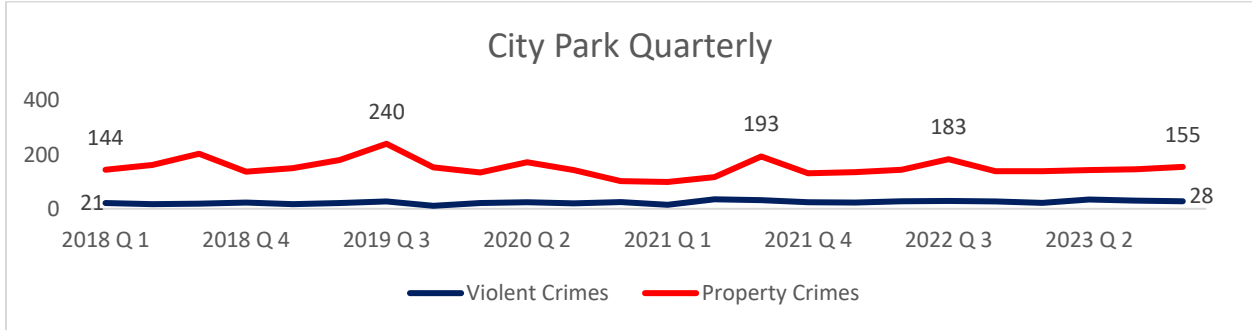
Property crime in Confederation SC has also increased significantly. The most significant increase was due to Shoplifting Under \$5000 specifically at one commercial business. (751 incidents in 2023 occurred at a single commercial business). These types of reports reflect crime occurring in the area, but can also be affected by businesses and their respective design, policies, and reporting practices. The SPS has engaged with the City of Saskatoon and local businesses to encourage Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) practices which can empower local businesses and deter crime.

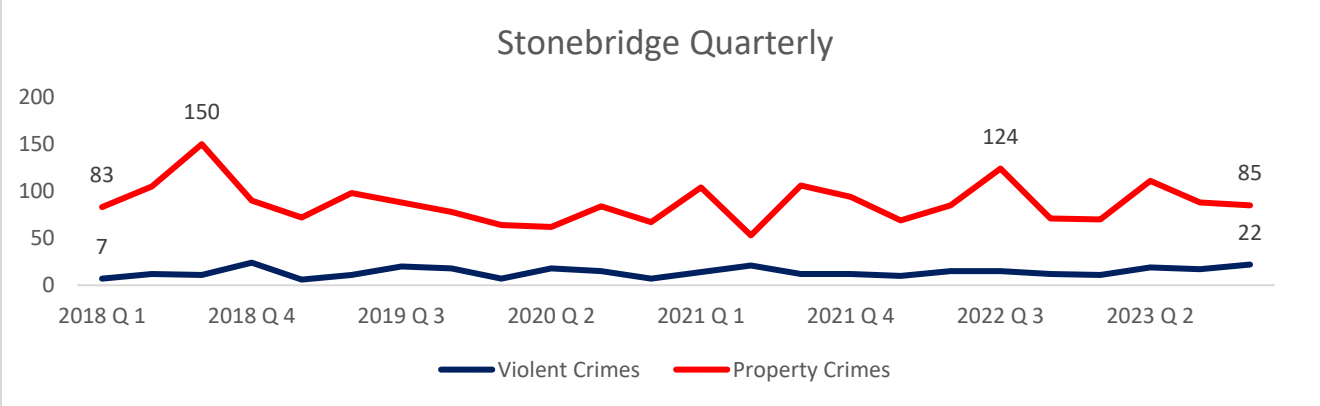
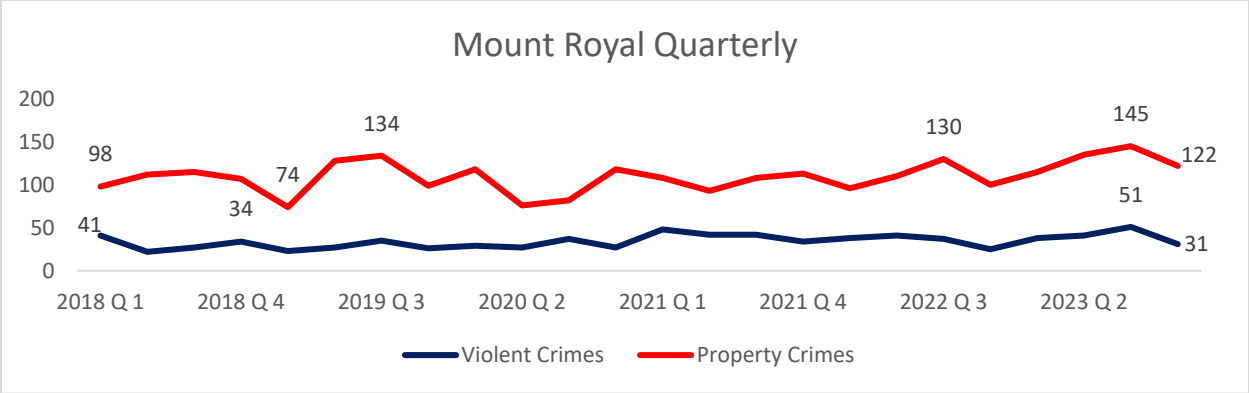
Top 5 Types of Calls for Service Received in 2023 (Final call types) <sup>1</sup>

Four of the top five types of calls for service received from Confederation in 2023 are social disorder types. The fifth call type reflects the concerns seen in commercial settings like shoplifting.

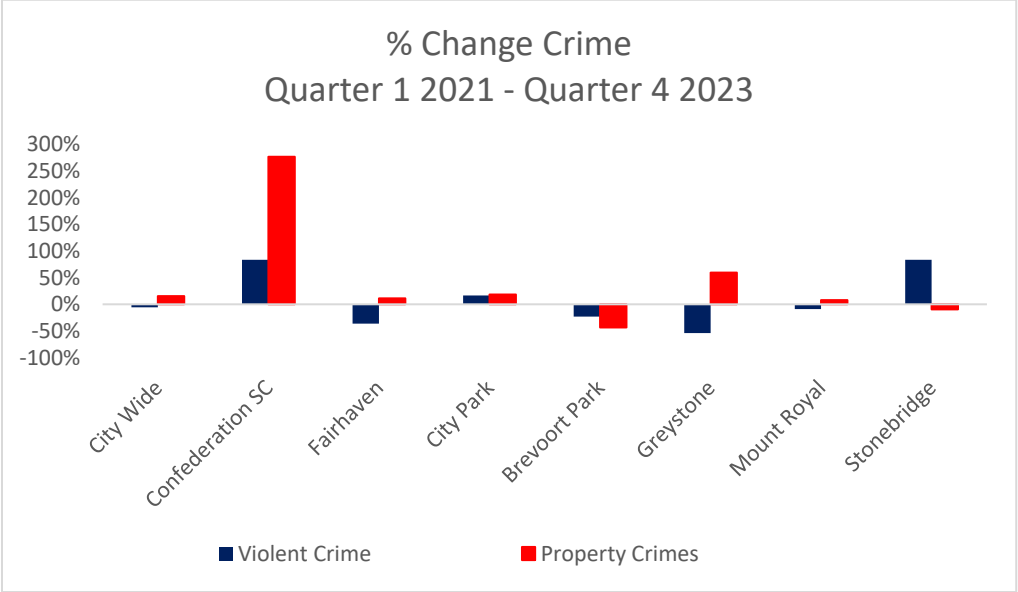
## Neighbourhood Comparisons

When reviewing the Statistics provided for the EWC at the end of this document, most of the activity recorded is categorized under Other Criminal Code. This mainly entails the following:

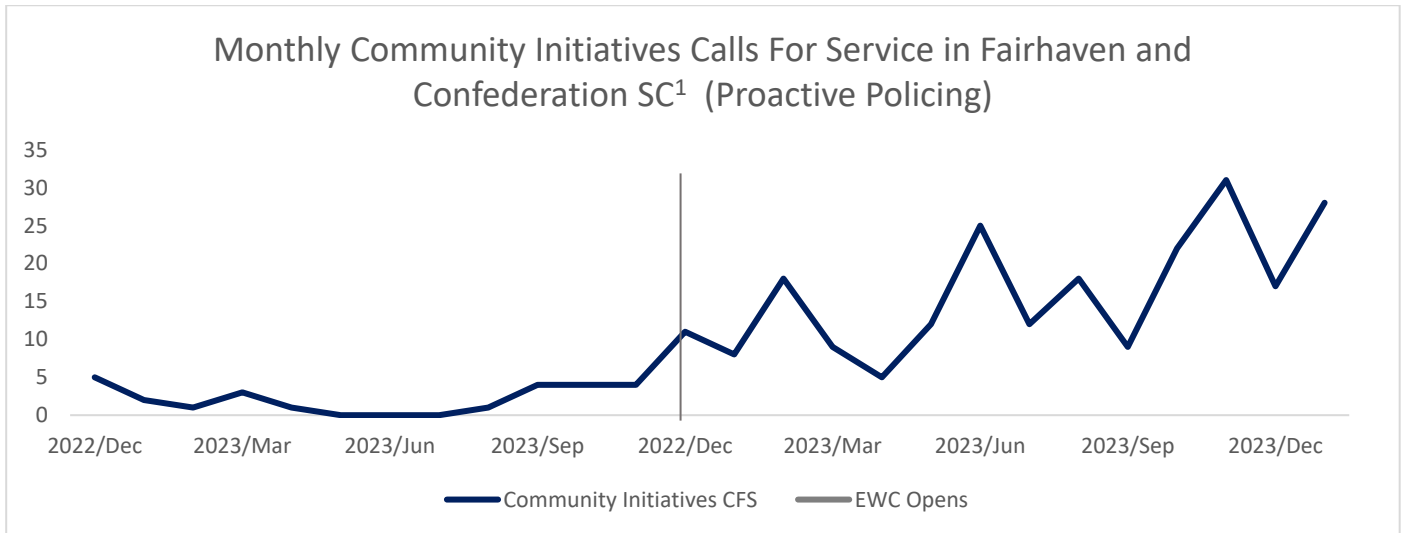
- Breaches of prohibition/probation orders or fail to attend/comply
- Disturbing the Peace

## **SPS Response in Fairhaven and Confederation SC**

When the EWC opened, the SPS created an operational plan to understand impacts to community safety. Since Spring 2023 (May 19<sup>th</sup>), Alternative Response Officers (ARO)s have been deployed regularly during their shifts to the areas surrounding the EWC. Monday-Friday, AROs have regularly been in the area of the EWC for 1-4 hours in the morning and again in the afternoon. Regular activities included:

- Foot and Vehicle patrol in the general area including parks, parking lots and the area around EWC
- Checking in and building relationships with local businesses, organizations and community at large to respond to any concerns
- Building relationships with schools including presentations, conversations and area cleanup
- Meeting with EWC employees to understand their current policies and help with enforcement, collect seized weapons
- Cleanup and/or seize drugs, needles, weapons or other found property as required.
- Hand out water bottles or toques/scarves as required
- Conflict de-escalation
- Respond to civilian requests/concerns
- Attend to encampments (over 55 times, often in coordination with Saskatoon Fire Department)
- Wellness Checks (over 50 checks mentioned in reports)
- Educate people on loitering, ensuring they are aware of community resources and safety of businesses/parking lots.
- Educate people on public drug use, ensuring they are aware of community resources and safety of businesses/parking lots (minimum 9 instances recorded).

In addition to AROs, regular SPS activities have officers interacting with the community. Proactive Calls for Service generated by the SPS is another measure of efforts made by all divisions of SPS to interact with the community.



Community communication channels can occur through SPS Executive Team members, our Community Engagement Division which includes Community Liaison Officers and all other members. The SPS has communicated with the community in a number of ways:

- CPTED Reviews for local businesses, engaging the city when required
- Meeting with local businesses to discuss concerns and make presentations
- Attended Fairhaven Community Association meeting
- Regular patrol work
- Assistance to businesses through signage or bylaw enforcement

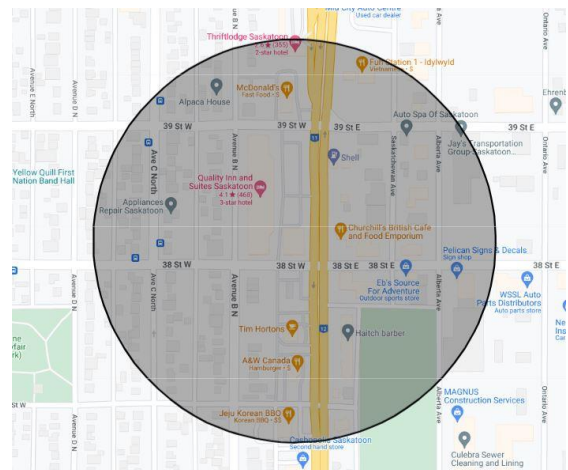
## Idylwyld Drive Corridor

The SPS is in contact with the Province of Saskatchewan and the service provider for the location at 1710 Idylwyld Drive North and will continue to plan as information becomes available. The SPS understands that this location will be operated under a different business model than other shelters and as such will require a different response.

Once the service provider’s plan for 1710 Idylwyld Drive North is clear, the SPS will be able to evaluate the potential for ARO deployment or for other community safety responses. In the meantime, the SPS has been considering some aspects of the future facility including current patrol distribution in the neighbourhood. Other considerations include the proximity to hotels as hotels have the potential to attract illicit activity and can become hotspots for specific crimes such as drug dealing or human trafficking. Additionally, Idylwyld Drive is a highway that reduces its speed to become a city street only a few blocks north of the location. This is a busy street used by commuters and people trying to access the numerous businesses on either side. As shelter clients are often pedestrians or walk to take the bus, the safety of this street is an important variable to consider. While SPS only collects reports on more serious collisions (principally when a vehicle involved is no longer drivable or someone is injured), there have been 67 collisions reported to the SPS between Jan 1, 2018 and Sept 30, 2023, on Idylwyld between 36<sup>th</sup> Street and the Idylwyld ramps to Circle Drive. Of these collisions, there were 10 injuries. To date, all of the people reported injured in these incidents were inside a vehicle and not pedestrians or cyclists. While the sidewalk along this building is currently quite wide, any plans for a shelter should consider keeping pedestrians, smokers or other people outside the shelter safe.

Finally, current concerns from residents are reflected in Call for Service data. From Dec 1, 2021 to Jan 31, 2024, the top 5 call for service types (final types) in a 250m radius of the 1710 Idylwyld Drive location were:

The report should clearly identify the proposed course of action for the residents of Mayfair and Sutherland as operations of each facility commence.

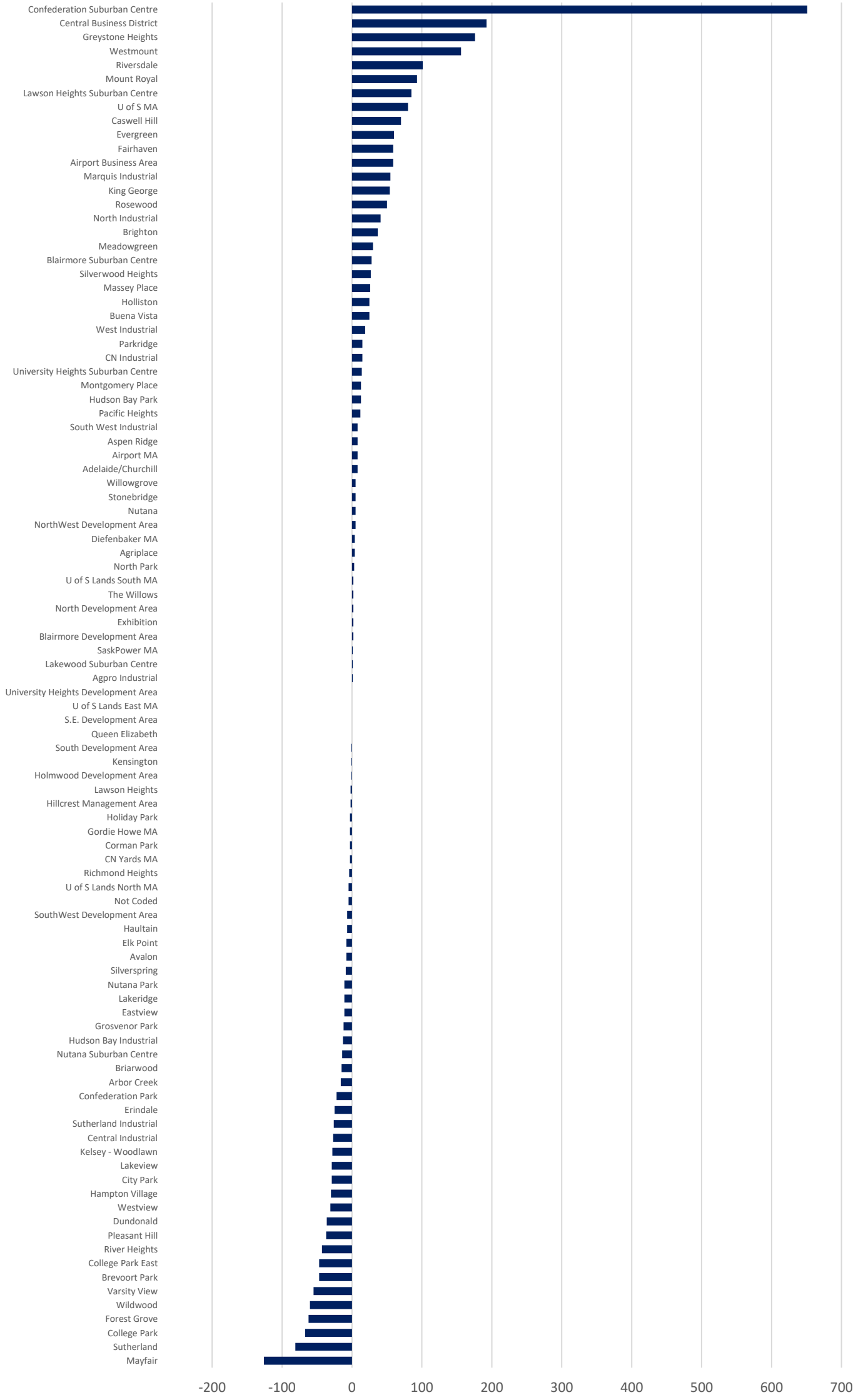

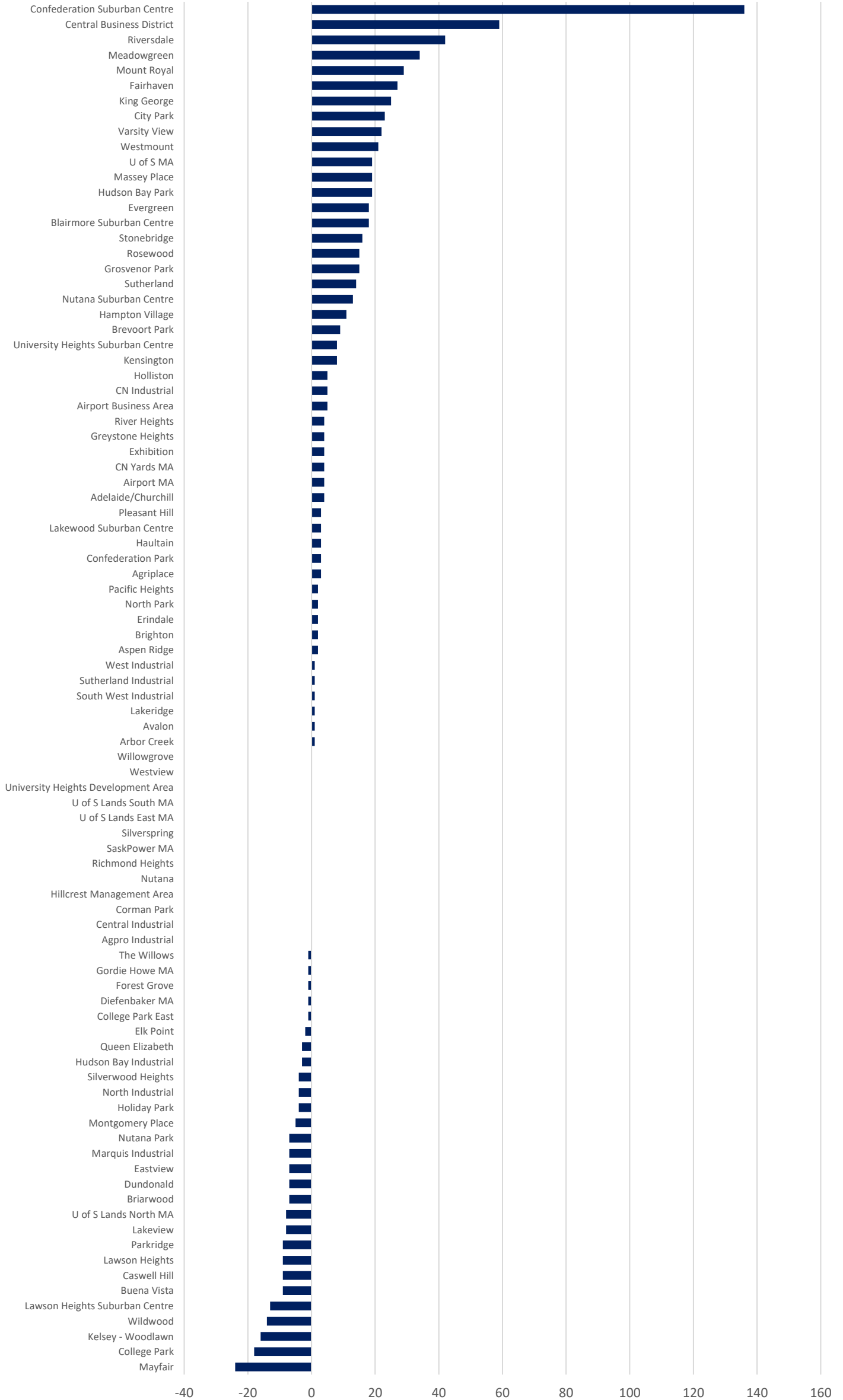
