What is the Community Support Program?

In July 2012, the City of Saskatoon established a Community Support Program (CSP) aimed at addressing street activity in the Broadway, Downtown and the Riversdale Business Improvement Districts (BID). This program includes and engages:

- The Public through a highly visible presence that reassures and responds to the public in the Downtown, Broadway and Riversdale BID.
- *Vulnerable Persons* by connecting community members in need to the appropriate service providers or other supports.
- **Business Owners** through foot patrols that liaise with local businesses to identify issues and collaborate to generate solutions.












